



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# You are Leading 100+ QI Projects!

- 41 around NAS
- 26 around maternal OUD
- 13 around immediate postpartum LARC
- 42 around hypertension or hemorrhage
- 12 around maternal depression

### **You** Impacted OUD Structure Measures! Baseline compared to January-March 2021

Standardized education materials for OUD/NAS

45% vs. 86% (**1**41%)

Used a validated, self-report screening tool for substance use in pregnancy

34% vs. 86% (152%)

Provide opioid pharmacotherapy for pregnant women with OUD

41% vs. 72% (**1**31%)

Developed referral relationships with OUD treatment programs

72% vs. 90% (**1**8%)

Developed clinical pathways/order sets for pregnant women with OUD

### **You** Impacted NAS Structure Measures! Baseline compared to January-March 2021

Average percentage of nursing staff caring for newborns trained in validated assessments for NAS 63% vs. 77% (14%)

QI efforts in place to increase inter-rater reliability for NAS assessments 21% vs. 30% (\$9%)

Standardized nonpharmacologic protocols for NAS 69% (Oct.-Dec. 2019) vs. 88% (19%)

Used standardized pharmacologic protocols for NAS 75% (Oct.-Dec. 2019) vs. 82% (7%)
